

# MEASURING THE PACE OF JUSTICE

**THROUGH DATA:**  
*A ranking of states  
high courts of Nigeria.*

## Executive Summary

The ranking of State High Courts according to their speed of justice delivery became necessary in the absence of data to benchmark the performance of High Courts of States. It is difficult to change what cannot be measured. Hence, to improve justice delivery in Nigeria, stakeholders need adequate data to make informed decisions.

This research paper gives the estimated number of legal problems per state, how long a case stays in Court's docket from filing to judgement, the rank of each state high courts vis a vis other states in Nigeria. The data samples randomly chosen per state are 50 cases from filing date to judgment date. In total, 1,388 cases were analysed from 33 states in Nigeria. It is observed that there are more cases in the southern states than northern states.

This document is not aimed at ridiculing any state, however, we hope that this will stimulate the activities of states judiciary towards seeking more creative pathways to increasing the speed of justice delivery and also provide a basis for evidence-based advocacy by the judicial arm for more resource allocation in areas of man-power and tech-for-justice tools to the judiciary.

## Methodology



The methods used in this research paper is by reviewing the timeline of 50 cases in each of the 33 states' available data; from commencement to judgment stage and finding the average per state.

One million legal problems is estimated to arise from a population of eight million people, according to the **Hague Institute for Innovation of Law**, and this formula was applied to the population per state to determine estimated legal problems per state.

The ranking positions were based on the average number of time spent on each case in comparison to the other states.

## Note



This research paper is to help both government and development partners know how to improve the pace of justice delivery in Nigeria and to stimulate the “can do better spirit” among states.

The challenges identified in this research paper should inform tailored and better solutions to help the Nigerian justice sector overcome its snail paced justice delivery process.

If a judge dedicates an hour to a case per day where an average court sits openly between the hours of 9am- 3pm Monday – Friday. Hence, such judge can only attend to 6 cases daily. However, in the situation that the judge dedicates 30 minutes to each case, then he can only attend to 12 cases daily.

From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 212 cases. The Abia State Judiciary is the 3rd arm of the Government of Abia State, constitutionally vested with the power to interpret, construe and apply the law. The Judiciary in Abia State constitutes a system of courts, which comprises the High Court, Customary Court of Appeal, Magistrate Courts and Customary Courts. Constitutionally the High Court of Abia State, subject to some provisions of the

jurisdiction to hear and determine any civil proceedings in which the existence or extent of a legal right, power, duty, liability, privilege, interest, obligation or claim is in issue or to hear and determine any criminal proceedings involving or relating to any penalty, forfeiture, punishment or other liability in respect of an offence committed by any person. Abia has a high case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts

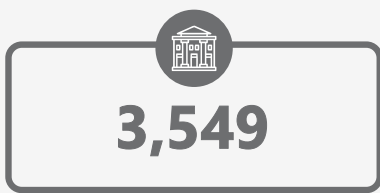
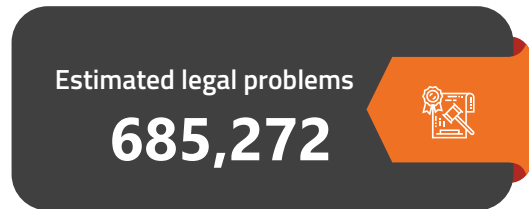

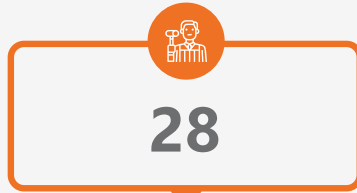
From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 12 cases. Popularly known as the land of beauty, hospitality and sunshine with a total area of 36,917 km<sup>2</sup>. Adamawa has a total number of 8 High court judges. It is surprising

to know that in a state with 4,248,436 population and 531,055 estimated legal problems, only 94 cases reaches State High Courts. It has the lowest case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts.

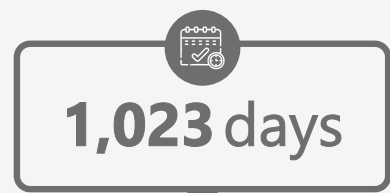

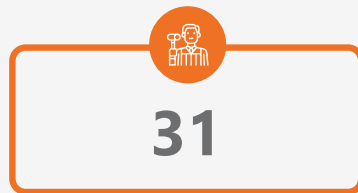
It takes approximately three years for a civil case to be determined in the state. For a state known for its economic activities, administration of justice must be faster to promote economic dispute resolution.

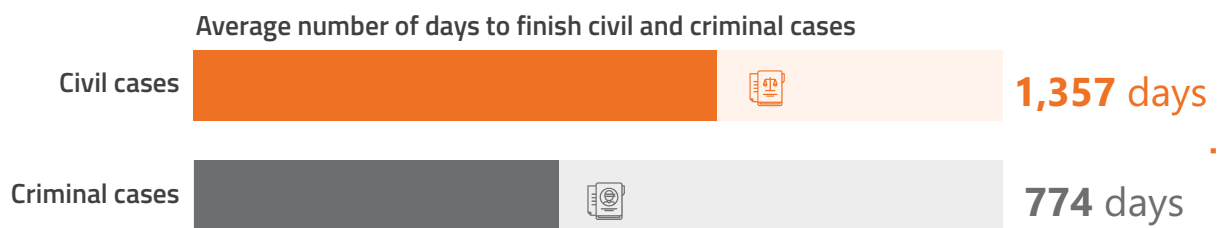

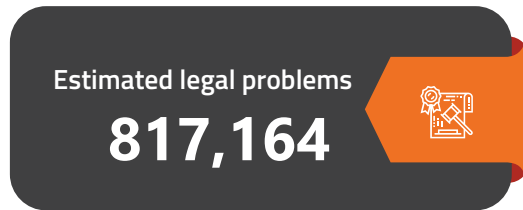
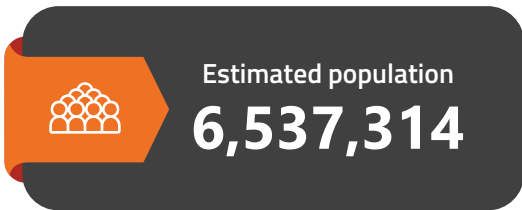


From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 329 cases. In Anambra State, quite a number of cases are filed every day. The Magistrate Courts dispose summarily about 80% of these cases while the High Court handles about 20%, which constitutes the most delicate and complex matters. The functions of the Judiciary are carried out in different

spheres. While some are adjudicatory, others are administrative and they are executed with the assistance of Court employees or attaches for the effective justice delivery. Presently in Anambra State there are 31 Judges of the High Court serving an estimated population of over 5.5 million people. It has a high case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts.



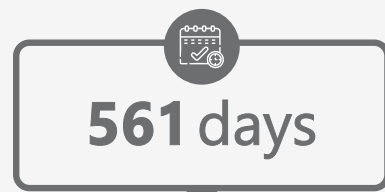

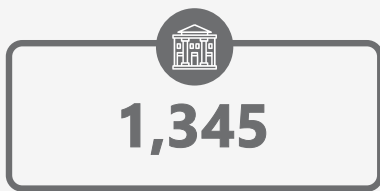
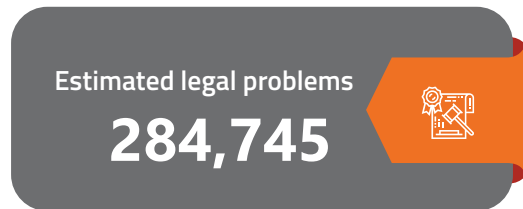


From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 76 cases. With a slogan as "Pearl for tourism", it takes an approximate number of 332 days to round off a criminal

long compared to the provision of Administration of Criminal Justice Act that mandates 180 days timeline. It has a low case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts.

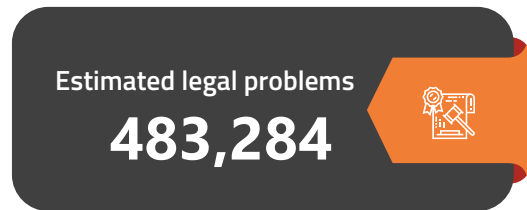
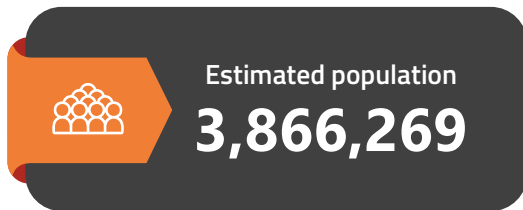

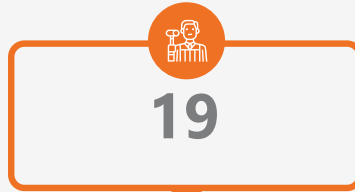
From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 27 cases. The dispensation of justice is really commendable as the data shows that a criminal case is resolved on average

From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 243 cases. Situated in the region known as South-south geopolitical zone, with an area of 16,842 square kilometers and the twenty third largest state in Nigeria. It has a high case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts with High court judges adjudicating approximately 7,055 problems annually. It has 25 Local Government Areas and 29 high court

judges spread across the state, the estimated period of three years and 2 months from commencement of a criminal trial to judgment stage depicts a slow-paced justice system and it is cogent that national and state machinery is put in place to ensure that the justice sector becomes even more effective and a safe haven for the common man.

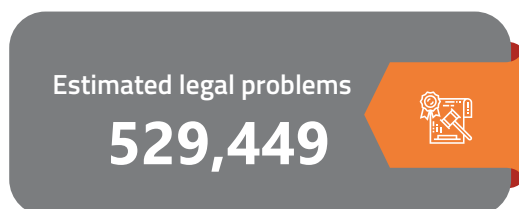

takes to round off a criminal trial it is noteworthy to state that the 121 cases often have a two months adjournment recurrent time line.



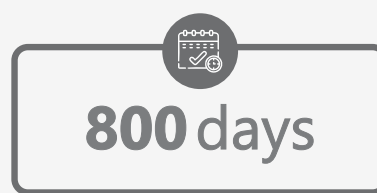

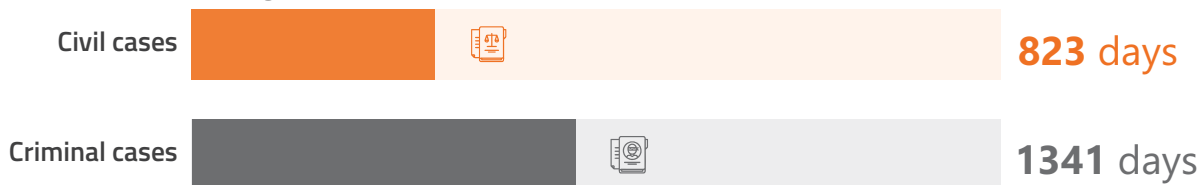

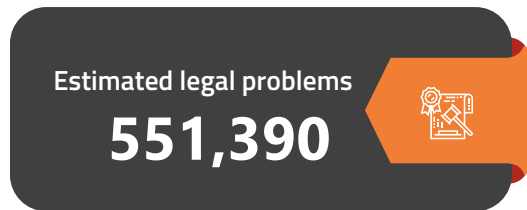

From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 250 cases. They are served by 23 Judges of the High Court of Edo State. It takes 1341 days which is approximately 4 years to administer justice in a criminal case. This is way over the provision of Administration of Criminal Justice Act.

Together, the High Courts, Magistrates' Courts, Area/ Customary Courts carry out judicial functions of the Judiciary in Edo State. It has a high case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts.

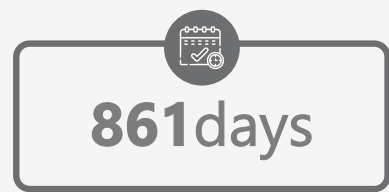

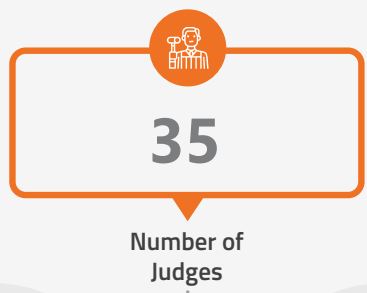
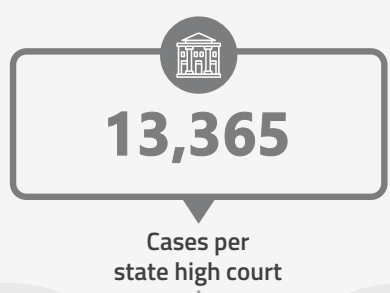


From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 323 cases' Enugu is one of the states in the south eastern part of Nigeria, created in 1991 from the part of Anambra state. With an area of 7,161 Km<sup>2</sup>, It has a high case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts. High court judges

adjudicates approximately 7,100 legal problems annually. It has 17 Local Government Areas and 22 high court judges spread across the state, the estimated period of three years and sixty days from commencement of a criminal trial to judgment stage depicts a slow-paced justice system.



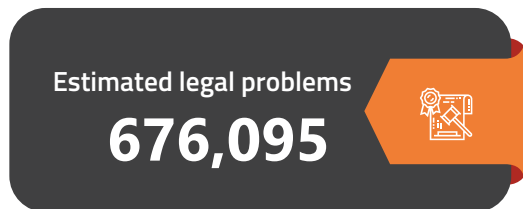
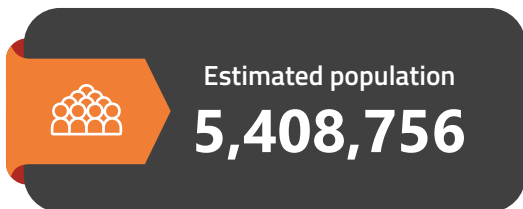
# F.C.T Abuja



Federal Capital Territory(FCT) Abuja is the capital of Nigeria. It takes over four years to round off a civil trial and three years to round off a criminal trial. This is contrary to 180 days stipulated in the Administration of Criminal Justice Act(ACJA)

While there is no statutorily stipulated days for civil case, it is expected that such cases will be rounded off within a reasonable time, however, 1,477 days is too long to try a case in the capital of the country.

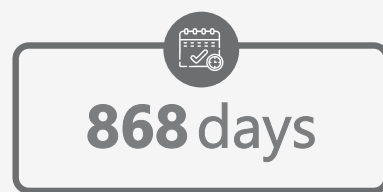

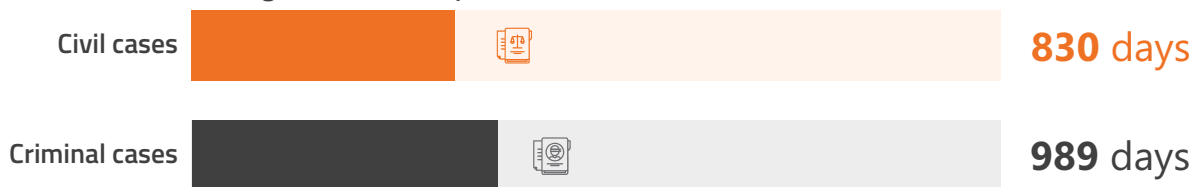

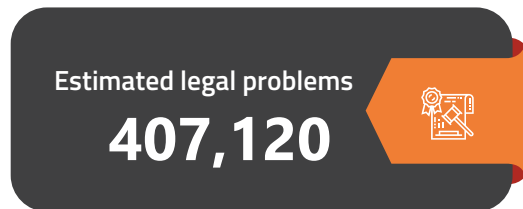

From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 444 cases. Imo has the highest case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts. Located in the south east region of the country, Imo state has an area of 5,530 km<sup>2</sup>. Imo state is celebrated as the home of peace and tourism. It has 7,103 legal problems per state high court. It has 27 Local

Government Areas and 16 high court judges spread across the state, the estimated period of two years and ten months from commencement of a criminal trial to judgment stage falls short of the provisions of the Administration of Criminal Justice Law.

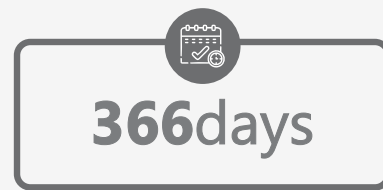

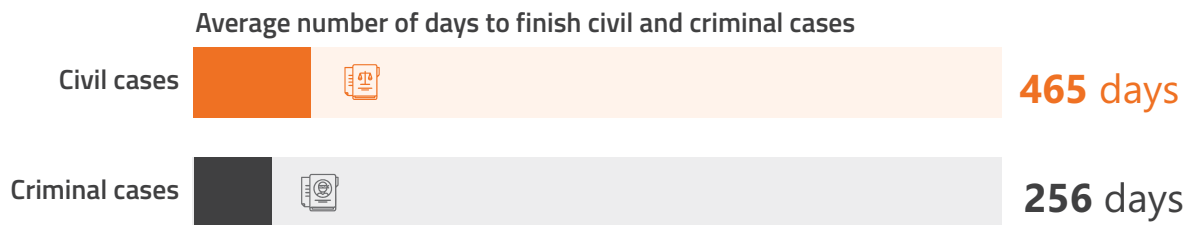

other state but actually leaves more to be desired in the justice delivery sector system. However, it is observed that Gombe has a low ratio per cases in State High Court of 638 compared to other states.

other States High Courts. A state with such a high number of population needs an efficient justice delivery system. It is doubtful if just 16 judges will be able to cater for 8 million people.

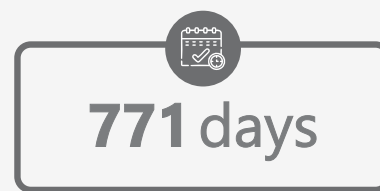

to complete. This is fair, however, there is room for improvement to meet up with the provisions of the ACJL mandating that a criminal trial should be conducted within 180 days

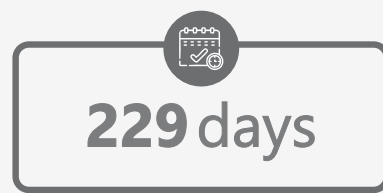

The average number of days to finish a criminal trial is higher than 180 days stipulated in the Administration of Criminal Justice Act.

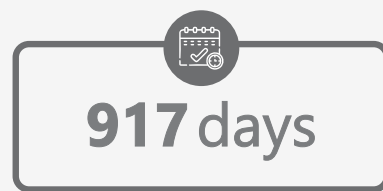

A three years time frame to resolve civil case and a two years time frame to resolve criminal cases are too slow to handle the peculiarity of Lagos

State being an economic hub. However, The Commercial (Fast Track) Division, The Special Offences Courts and The Sexual Offences Courts, The Small Claims Court and their Lagos State (Civil Procedure) Rule 2019 are recognizable ways through which the court tries to speed up the administration of Justice.

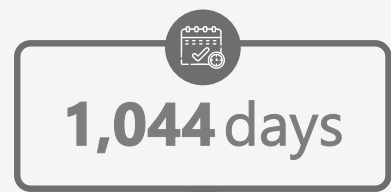

Court. 182 days from commencement of a criminal trial to judgment stage is a benchmark worthy of emulation by other states.

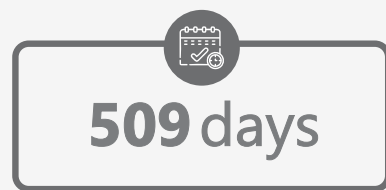

which are the High Court, Magistrate Court and Customary Court. Ogun has a high case per judge ratio vis-a-vis other States High Courts.



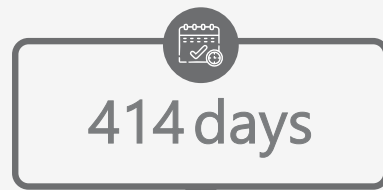

From the analysis above a judge handles an average of 94 cases. Presently in Osun State there are 19 Judges of the High Court serving an estimated population of over 5 million

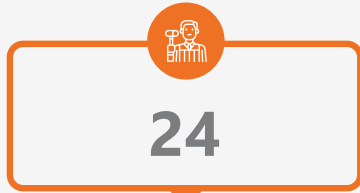
people. The time frame it takes to resolve civil cases in Osun is remarkably high compared to other south-western states except Lagos State which is the economic hub of Nigeria.



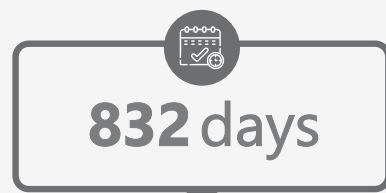
